Palliative Care Program:

Toronto Central CCAC has a Palliative Care program available to offer clients and families access to experienced palliative care coordinators and services for those who wish to remain at home. Case management support relieves some of the stresses families face during these challenging days and the team shares their knowledge of services available to assist with pain and symptom management, caregiver support, and emotional, psychological, and spiritual issues.

Recent changes to our palliative program are designed to improve the client experience. We have nine palliative care coordinators providing care and support to approximately 500 clients each month in the Toronto Central LHIN. Our goal is to provide quality client-centered care to individuals who are living with or dying of an advanced illness and their families and to ease suffering in order to provide the highest quality of life possible throughout the illness trajectory.

The Program

Our team provides palliative care coordination and assists clients and families in navigating their way through the health care system. An assessment is completed and an individualized comprehensive plan of care is developed with the clients and family, incorporating their wishes and goals of care including wishes around place of death. We provide support across the care continuum, helping clients and families make informed decisions and supporting their transitions.

There is support from a coordinated care team with 24 hour / 7 day responsiveness. Linkages with community palliative physicians, medical, social, community, and hospice-based services are arranged as needed and easy access to necessary services, support, and information is facilitated.

Our Client Population

We primarily work with adults who are living with or dying of an advanced illness; however, we also act in a consultative role with the Child and Family and Urban health teams. Typically our clients have an expected life span of twelve months or less and have a life-limiting condition.

- **Client population by diagnosis:**
Cancer – 70% Other – 30%

- **Average length of stay on palliative program:**
Approx. 4-5 months

- **Referrals:**
Community – 30% Hospital – 70%

Partners in Care

Palliative care at home is provided by a multi-disciplinary team working together with the client and their family. This team may include:

- Palliative Care Physician teams (Temmy Latner Centre for Palliative Care, Toronto Grace Hospital, and St. Joseph's Health Centre)
- Service Providers – (e.g. Nursing, Personal Support, Social Work, Occupational Therapy, Medical Supplies & Equipment)
- Family Health Teams and/or Primary Care Physician
- Community Health Centres
- Pharmacies
- Regional Cancer Centres – Odette & Princess Margaret Hospital
- Acute Care Hospitals
- Palliative Care Units and Hospices

General News

A recent report by the Ontario Hospital Association, Ontario Association of CCACs and the Ontario Federation of Community Mental Health & Addictions Program titled: "Ideas & Opportunities for Bending the Health Care Cost Curve" outlines proposals and initial work being undertaken on cost savings for the health care system and includes a focus on hospice palliative care. The Ministry of Health & Long-Term Care recently introduced The Excellent Care for All Act, in which all healthcare organizations will be required to:

"Develop and post annual quality improvement plans; Create quality committees to report to each hospital board on quality related issues, including the public annual quality improvement plan; Link executive compensation to achievement of quality plan performance improvement targets; and Implement patient and employee satisfaction surveys and a patient complaints process".

The Ontario Quality Hospice Palliative Care Coalition will be planning a follow-up (from its June 2009 Think Tank Day) retreat to address provincial hospice palliative care system design within the province. This event will occur on June 17 and 18, 2010 and is by invitation only. The TCPCN will be attending.

Cancer Care Ontario (CCO) will be updating its next Ontario Cancer Plan, and invited the TCPCN, through the Toronto Central Regional Cancer Program Steering Committee, to provide input. CCO expressed interest in furthering their focus and efforts in the area of hospice palliative care, recognizing the future factors that will place greater emphasis on hospice palliative care.

The Honourable Sharon Carstairs, P.C. held a series of roundtable discussions earlier this year on the progress in hospice palliative care since her report "Still Not There". These roundtables were held to support the development of another five-year report marking the progress since her last report in 2005. The roundtable that took place in Toronto was held on February 23, 2010. The Network and a number of its members were in attendance. Some key discussion themes were: the role of hospice palliative care in long-term care, funding, national policy and strategy, and education and awareness. This will be the Hon. Carstairs' last report as she will be retiring. The report is expected to be released June 2010.

The Canadian Cancer Society will be releasing *Canadian Cancer Statistics 2010* on Wednesday May 19, 2010. In addition to the general cancer statistics, there will be a special focus on end-of-life and palliative care. Attention will be put on what needs to be done in Canada to ensure that people dying from cancer have access to high-quality palliative care. Find more information at www.cancer.ca

On June 26-27, 2010, Toronto will host the G20 Summit. A number of traffic and access restrictions will be in place within downtown Toronto to address security issues associated with this international event. The Toronto Police have assured the TCPCN that access in order to provide care for hospice palliative care patients will be supported. Only one residential building will be placed as a "High Security Zone" during this time period – resulting in a number of access requirements. A larger area of the city (encompassing parts of Spadina, Queen Street West, Front Street, and the Lakefront) will be impacted by a number of traffic management activities at certain times before, during, and after the summit. ▪ A number of new regional hospice palliative care system tools are available for regional use by health care workers, community support workers and others.

- The (Hospice) Palliative Care Common Referral Form was recently revised after a year-long stakeholder engagement exercise lead by members of the Toronto In-Patient Palliative Care Unit and representatives from across the five GTA LHIN hospice palliative care networks. This form will assist in enhanced services referral for hospice palliative care services in all relevant care settings. You can access the form at www.tpcn.ca
- The hospice palliative care Asset Map for the Toronto Central LHIN is available. This map lists all the core hospice palliative care services providers under the TCPCN who service residents in the LHIN. The map provides information on the type of services offered, admission criteria, service limiting criteria, admission/operation hours, types of human resources and volunteers within each organization and service. An Education Day is being planned in the GTA LHINs for community nurses on hospice palliative care with a focus on providing an overview of key fundamental knowledge and information in hospice palliative care. It is with great pleasure to announce that the Homelessness & Palliative Care Committee (Chaired by Paddy Bowen, Executive Director of the St. Felix Centre) will be integrated into the Toronto Central Palliative Care Network and will function within the Network structure. This move demonstrates the continued commitment by the Network and its health care and community partners in aligning and coordinating shared efforts in hospice palliative care. TCPCN, along with the other GTA LHIN networks met with the Regional Geriatric Program (RGP) on March 26, 2010 to provide an overview of the hospice palliative care sectors within each of the GTA LHINs, and to showcase initiatives within hospice palliative care. Shared issues that were identified were capacity building and hospice palliative care services within the long-term care sector. This meeting has created some initial steps in the partnering up of RGP and hospice palliative care services in Toronto.

Discussions are currently underway exploring the role of hospice palliative care in the much lauded and successful Emergency Mobile Nursing Services in Toronto Central LHIN. This program has been extremely successful in addressing enhanced care for seniors in long-term care and limited avoidable Emergency Department visits. A number of community volunteer hospices, visiting physician programs, and hospital in-patient palliative care programs are exploring partnerships with EMNS.

For the first time, a knowledge exchange / transfer session was hosted by TCPCN in partnership with the Canadian Cancer Society to the Network's health and community support partners in the region. The session provided information on the hospice palliative care (HPC) sector as a whole and how each sub-sector within HPC operated: community programs, residential hospices, long-term care, and hospital programs. There was an excellent turn out by partners. The Network will plan future sessions on a regular basis for the region.

National Hospice Palliative Care Week was celebrated widely this year in the TC LHIN. The Network and its members took an active role in supporting this campaign in which the theme was to ensure that the voices of those living with a terminal life-threatening illness, their caregivers, and family members are heard in order to better understand the value and meaning of hospice palliative care. Educational events were generously hosted by the Hospital for Sick Children, The Temmy Latner Centre for Palliative Care, St. Michael's Hospital, and the Toronto Central Regional Cancer Programs (Princess Margaret Hospital & Odette Cancer Centre, Sunnybrook Health Sciences Centre). Community and residential hospices developed fact sheets and resource tables for that week. Thank you for coming out to support hospice palliative care. It was a great success, and we look forward to next year!

- The 8th annual Hike for Hospice Palliative Care in Toronto was held on May 2, 2010 in Riverdale Park and it was a great success. Four Toronto Hospices (Alliance Hospice, Hospice Toronto, Perram House, and Philip Aziz Centre) partnered again this year to organize the event and together they raised \$80,000 to support hospice programs. Many thanks to clients, their families, hospice volunteers, and friends for all their support and efforts on making this year's hike such a success!

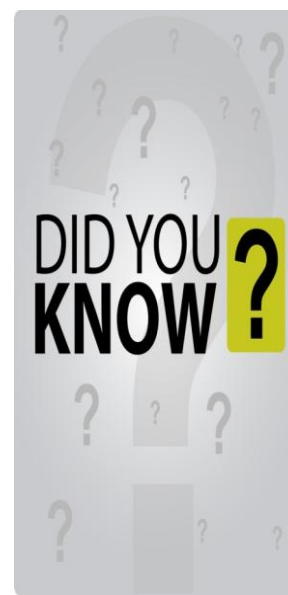
The Network extends a warm welcome to its newest members for 2010-11:
